It sure seems like a long time since we last cranked out a newsletter. Since you last heard from us, I have personally been to what seems like over 100 meetings. In trying to select what would be the most important issue to discuss with you for this column, the obvious choice was EDUCATION. There are so many things that are going on in the City of Los Angeles, but none more important (if you have young children) than our neighborhood school, Carthay Center LEARN (CCL).

CCL (located at the corner of Crescent Heights and Olympic) has recently celebrated its 70th anniversary. WAYNE SCOTT MOORE, the principal, is not only a sincere and genuine man, but one of the nicest people that you will ever meet. The teachers at CCL are top flight. It is currently undergoing remodeling thanks to Bond BB funds. Many of the teachers are local products and graduates of UCLA or USC. Over 80% of their enrollment is from the local area. And the list of all the positives could easily consume this entire column.

The reason why I have chosen to discuss this issue over all of the things that confront our association right now is that when I was the president of the PTA at CCL (1992-93), I could never figure out why the local neighborhood children not only did not attend CCL, but parents didn't feel comfortable sending their kids to school to CCL. As time went on, after I retired from the PTA presidency, several families moved out of our association because they simply did not want to send their kids to school at CCL. This troubled me very deeply (as both of my children went to CCL).

I continue to work voluntarily at the school and you can not imagine how great a feeling it is to see the neighbor-

hood associations finally giving their support to the local school (CCL). Obviously, going to private school is not financially within the reach of a lot of us and with Open Charter School moving to Westchester in the summer of 1999 (for most of us Open Charter School wouldn't have been accessible because it is a Magnet school), these two factors shocked us into looking at CCL.

I want to end this endorsement of CCL by thanking CHARLIE COHEN, CAROLINE HARRISON AND SUSAN SANFORD for taking up the torch that a few of us had carried for so many years (and continue to carry) regarding the fact that there is NO legitimate reason not to send your children to our local school.

I applaud their hard work, their keeping us notified of what is going on at CCL via fliers to our home mailboxes, their organizing meetings with the school staff and principal, and simply for their great insight to honestly state what a handful of us have known for a long time that Carthay Center LEARN is one of the best kept secrets in the City of Los Angeles. They have scheduled a new parents meeting at Carthay Center School for 7:30 on May 12th. If you are thinking about what to do with your children who are just now going to start kindergarten, look no further than Carthay Center LEARN.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL - DO YOU HAVE TO GO PRIVATE?

This fall a group of parents from the Westside Jewish Community Center, frustrated at the prospect of spending \$60,000 or more over the next six years on their kindergarten aged childrens elementary school education, decided to take a look at their neighborhood school, the Carthay Center Elementary School. They had expected to find it wasnt a viable alternative and to move on to the standard choices: private school, open enrollment at schools that are far away, or moving from the neighborhood to somewhere with a better public school. But what they found at Carthay surprised them:

- Experienced, enthusiastic and ambitious teachers led by an energetic, committed and innovative Principal.

- Carthay is a L.E.A.R.N. School (L.A. Alliance for Restructuring Now) which allows a greater access to grant money. All monies donated to the school stay within the school. (In addition to other grants, several local realtors have recently agreed to donate a percentage of their commissions to the school.)

- Carthay has a G.A.T.E. program for gifted and talented students.

- Over 80% of the kids at Carthay are from this school district.

- Carthay has two open classrooms (1st-3rd grades) as well as more traditional, single grade classrooms. The kindergarten teachers are trained to assess which kids will do best in which environment so that a child can follow his optimum developmental path.

-All the classrooms are set up so that the children can achieve their highest potential. Thus if a 2nd grader is reading at 4th grade level, he can be paired with other, similarly gifted kids for reading. If, however, his math abilities are at his own grade level, he can be grouped with different kids for math.

-Principal Moore and his staff study and dissect test scores to see which areas need help and which (like the open classrooms) are succeeding so well that they might be expanded.

-Carthay has seen many recent improvements (new computers in every classroom, new paint job) and is scheduled for many more (air conditioning, playground equipment, etc.)

-Carthay has a vibrant after-school program featuring many enrichment courses in writing, science, math, dance, computers, sports, etc.

Parents found the Carthay Center Elementary School to be an exciting safe and stimulating place where kids are encouraged to go as far as their abilities will allow. Small class sizes and flexible teaching strategies support each child's unique learning style and personal development. The teachers are motivated, upbeat, and enthusiastic about their jobs. The Principal is innovative and open and, as Carthay is a small school, has the freedom to try things that Principals of larger schools can not. And the kids are wonderful. Why then wasnt more of the neighborhood considering it? A little history: Until the early 80s, Carthay Center was consid-

ered a model school, with an enrollment reflecting the rich multi-cultural and ethnic make-up of the area in which we live. There was a long list of parents waiting to get their children in. But then, with a rapid succession of Principals and changes in direction, the school lost much of its neighborhood support. Now, with Principal Moore at the helm for the last eight years, the school is again a thriving learning center. All it lacks is the full support of its community.

Everything is in place at Carthay to make it the model school it once was. All it needs is neighborhood attendance. Parents of kindergarten aged children should want their kids to have the best, safest and most challenging educational experience possible. With community support, they could find this experience at Carthay.

With this in mind a group of parents organized an April open house with the schools Principal, Wayne Moore, distributing leaflets to as much of the neighborhood as they could. They were amazed and excited to find over thirty interested parents and neighbors attending, many of whom have children who will be of kindergarten age in September. Clearly they had struck a nerve!

NEW SENIOR LEAD OFFICER APPOINTED

Los Angeles Police Officer Scott Hallock, a 17 year veteran of Law Enforcement, was recently selected over a large group of applicants and was appointed to the position of Senior Lead Officer at the Wilshire Community Police Station. Officer Hallock was immediately assigned to the Basic Car Area 7A33, which includes the Carthay Square and South Carthay Neighborhood Associations Areas

With this assignment, the Area left without Sr. Lead Officer representation for a seemingly unduly long period of time, has received a full time LAPD contact person with whom residents can relay their concerns. Ironically, Officer Hallocks assignment comes at a time when Police Chief Bernard Parks is planning on eliminating the Senior Lead Officer Position, as it is presently functioning.

Officer Hallock is currently replacing Officer Chuck Newman, who was promoted to Sergeant and transferred to the 77th Street Division.

Having begun his law enforcement career in Salt Lake City, Utah, Officer Hallock has been a member of the Los Angeles Police Department since 1989 and has served in a variety of assignments throughout his law enforcement career which makes him uniquely qualified to respond to the crime concerns of our residents.

When contacted to learn how he proposes to serve the needs of our

residents, Officer Hallock stated: I am dedicated to serving the

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**FEMINIST LEADER
 TONI CARABILLO DIES**

Toni Carabillo, feminist leader and historian who chronicled the feminist movement and helped found the national Feminist Majority and the California chapters of the National Organization for Women, died Tuesday. She was 71.

Carabillo died in her sleep in her Los Angeles home on Hi-Point of lung cancer. With her was her collaborator and life partner of 30 years, Judith Meuli.

The two women, along with June Csida, wrote Feminist Chronicles, 1953-1993, a textbook for college level womens studies courses. Carabillo had been working recently on a new book, The Feminist Chronicles of the 20th Century.

A writer and graphic designer by profession, Carabillo also co-authored a 1988 book with Meuli entitled The Feminization of Power. The two women had owned a graphic arts company in Los Angeles since 1970. In 1987, Carabillo, Meuli, Eleanor Smeal, Peg Yorkin and Katherine Spillar created the Feminist Majority, an organization designed to encourage womens empowerment. Carabillo served as national vice president.

She became involved in feminist causes 30 years ago when she joined NOW and then helped create chapters around

California. She served as president of the Los Angeles chapter and national vice president and board member. She also was co-editor of NOW's national newsletter and newspaper. Carabillo was a major fund-raiser and, organizer for the Equal Rights Amendment ratification campaign in the early 1980s. Born in Jackson Heights, N.Y., Carabillo was educated at Middlebury College and Columbia University.

She worked in corporate communications for System Development Corp. for 11 years. That job ended because of her participation in a survey of women employees showing sex discrimination in salaries and advancement.

In 1969 Carabillo co-founded the Womens Heritage Corporation which published the Womens Heritage Calendar and Almanac and a series of paperbacks on such women as Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucy Stone.
